Like me, you probably have mixed feelings about the issue of poverty and homelessness in our community. None of us wants to see people living on the streets, begging for money or food because they're hungry. We want to be generous, and we want to help but we have questions: Are these people just irresponsible? Are they addicted? Why can't our society seem to get a grip on this problem? Why can't our elected officials find a solution?

Well, the truth is that homelessness and poverty are most likely the results of multiple factors which we may never completely understand, and I doubt that we will find "the" solution any time soon. Perhaps things need to get a lot worse before our society decides to take action.

In the meantime, we have one responsibility as people of faith. We are to be generous towards the poor. Without knowing what lies behind a person's poverty, we are to give "cheerfully" as St. Paul tells us (2 Corinthians 9:7) and Jesus makes it clear that we will be judged on the basis of how well we love our neighbor—especially the neighbor in need. So, this is what we do.

As a parish family, we have taken this commandment seriously. We are already working in coordination with Catholic Charities, St. Vincent De Paul, the Bakersfield Police and other organizations to assist the poor and homeless. It may not amount to much when we consider the numbers of people out there who need help, but we are doing what we are supposed to do.

I'm grateful to our KC Council for always striving to find ways of serving the needs of the poor. By your leadership in this area, you are setting the example for our many parishioners who also believe that "it is better to give than to receive." Msgr Perry

Nicolas Andrade was born in the San Fernando area in 1995 to Nicolas and Irma Andrade. He is the oldest of the family's three children and has two sisters. He attended elementary, Jr. High and the first two years of high school in the San Fernando Valley before the family moved to Bakersfield in 2011. Nick graduated from Frontier High School in 2013.

As a youngster he loved reading, skateboarding, playing the guitar, and piano and was intently interested in Taekwondo and boxing. As a young teenager he played the guitar with the music group in Our Lady of Peace Catholic Church in the San Fernando Valley. He still loves to play music, especially the guitar, which to this day is his favorite pastime, along with creating graphic designs. After graduating from high school, he had an interest in pursuing a major in psychology, however due to financial reasons, he went to work for a local bank for five years. While there, he especially enjoyed working with the public, however left as he recognized there was a lack of advancement opportunities. Just prior to the pandemic he started his own company (The Orion Agency) in which he marketed his graphic designs. The current job market did not provide sufficient income for his company, so for additional income he took a job with a butcher shop and learned the art of butchery. When asked what kind of work he prefers, graphic design is by far his favorite. He is actively looking for work to utilize this area of his expertise and would welcome any such opportunity.

Nicolas was raised in a strong Catholic family. From the time of his youth, he was always inquisitive of his faith and would spend time reading about religious topics. His inquisitiveness led him to question whether he should be considered a Christian as opposed to a Catholic. As a young man of 21, Nick decided to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation and has over the past few years has come to realize the importance of Faith and Church in one's life. Beginning this year he has been a regular attendee at Sunday Mass. His father sensed his faith and when the Men's Retreat was advertised at Mass, to Nick's surprise, his father submitted the registration for him to attend. St. Vincent DePaul Center of Bakersfield, by Michael Dhanens

Feed the hungry. Shelter the homeless. Give alms to the poor. These are some of the corporal acts of mercy familiar to all of us who practice the Christian Faith. We read about them in scripture and hear about them from the pulpit. These three tenants form the core mission of the St. Vincent DePaul Center's activities in our community. Several churches, organizations, business, charities, individual donors and a small group of staff and volunteers help make these a reality for the growing number of poor and homeless in Bakersfield. Recent news accounts report that the number of homeless individuals in Bakersfield has grown by over 30%.

St. Vincent DePaul (1581-1660), canonized in 1737, is recognized for his charity and compassion for the poor and is the patron saint for charitable organizations. He is attributed with the following: "Humility if nothing but truth and pride is nothing but lying." His spirit certainly inspires the men and women who live out his mission today as they make a profound impact on the world. The SVDP Center in Bakersfield began in 1954 in the form of a thrift store and small

homeless center on East 19th Street. The Center outgrew this facility and relocated to its current location at 300 Baker Street in 1958. Sandwiches and coffee were handed out to the hungry in a small room or outside patio. Some surrounding parcels were acquired, and several additions and upgrades were made over the following decades. A dramatic influx of donations in 2007, along with support from St. Francis Parish, allowed a larger scale expansion and improvement plan to be implemented. This included bathrooms, shower facilities, covered patio, fencing and additional landscaping where visitors can spend time during the day in a secure and park-like setting. Services are provided to all visitors regardless of race or religion and all are treated as brothers and sisters in Christ. Thousands come to the center seeking help each year.

A Board of Directors provides overall direction and oversight. Oscar Zubiran is the current Operations Manager and John Thompson is the Center Coordinator. These gentlemen run a center with 6 or so paid staff, 4 to 5 VIP Volunteers (individuals who are themselves, homeless) and numerous other members of the community who help when they can. Several Knights of Columbus Councils in Bakersfield as well as the Chapter also contribute greatly to the operation. In addition to providing a safe and welcoming environment, the Center feeds approximately 400 individuals breakfast and lunch daily, distributes clothing and hygiene kits and offers showers. Partnering with Good Samaritan Hospital, the Center now is also able to offer, on site, Day Habilitative Services that include basic medical evaluation and care, behavioral health services and counseling for substance abuse issues.

The Center is always in need of donations in the form of clothing (especially men's), food and snacks, hygiene products, kitchen staples (oatmeal, coffee, spices and water) as well as plates, cups, bowls. The Bakersfield St. Vincent DePaul Society has no real source of income outside the annual fall barbeque fundraiser. They receive no government funding and rely solely on the generosity of the community. More information can be found on their website: https://svdpbakersfield.org.
